**NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT**

Notice is hereby given that the city council of the City of Hillsboro, Washington county, Oregon, did on March 2, 1926, pass a resolution declaring its intention to improve Third street, in said city, from a line eleven feet north of the center line of Grant street and extending thence north through Thorne's Second Addition to Hillsboro, Oregon, to the north line of the corporate limits of said city, such improvement to be made in the following manner, to-wit:

By bringing the surface of said portion of said Third street to the proper subgrade, paving the roadway with Portland cement concrete pavement of an approximate thickness of six inches, and 32 feet wide, together with intersection improvement to connect with the present pavement at Grant street, the said beginning line, laying and constructing concrete curbs, driveways, concrete cornerstones at driveways, providing suitable drainage, and by doing such other improvement work as will make a proper and appropriate improvement, said improvement to be made in accordance with the provisions of the Amended Charter and the ordinances of said city, and that at an estimated cost of \$1820.00.
