

**"Home and Mother"
Theme at Meeting**

"Home and Mother" was the theme of the program at the meeting of the Hillsboro Coffee club last Friday, April 9. Fifty women enjoyed the meeting.

Mrs. J. C. Lamkin, first president and one of the four charter members, related interesting events of early Coffee club days. Mrs. J. A. Imbrie spoke of homemaking forty years ago, saying that it was just an ordinary and contented farm home life. Mrs. M. A. Powell, a pioneer of 1845, related methods of

earlier days. "A small part of the mothers' work was the threshing of grain, and milling of it before the bread could be baked."

Several of the members brought various articles used in the early homes. A Bible, dated 1829, a teakettle over 200 years old and pieces of silverware were exhibited by Mrs. J. C. Lamkin. A baby dress worn 58 years ago was brought by Mrs. C. E. Koontz. An old fashioned fire shovel and potato masher over 100 years old was shown by Mrs. A. Sigler. Mrs. J. H. Lund, demonstrated how to spin on a spinning wheel that she used many years ago.

"The Real Income of the Home," was the subject of an address delivered by Miss Maud Wilson, home economist of O. A. C. "The standard of the home is a partnership between man and wife, one produces the income, the other applies it. The problem of applying the income more properly is solved greatly by budgeting both finances and time."

Special music, appropriate to mother, was furnished by Professor C. W. Lawrence and the male quartet of Pacific university.

Although not four years of age then, I remember a soldier giving me a piece of pineapple and taking me into his arms. That soldier was Alonzo Sigler. He told me that the soldiers would not let the Indians hurt the people. I can remember telling the playmates, among whom were Sol Jack and Ezekiel A. Eddy, what the soldier told me.—Albert Tozier.
