TRY THESE

Some of the recipes demonstrated at the recent Argus cooking school, by Mrs. Rose Bartlett, home economics expert of the Portland Gas company:

Jiffy Cake—1 1/2 cups flour, 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-3 cup butter, 2 egg yolks, 1 egg white, 1 teaspoon extract. Method: Melt butter in a measuring cup, add two egg yolks and one white, and fill cup with milk. Sift dry ingredients, add liquids. Mix thoroughly. This makes two small layers. Bake 20 minutes at 375 degrees.

Emergency Icing—1 egg white, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons cold water, few drops flavoring. Method: Place in double boiler and beat with Dover beater for 7 minutes.

Hamburg Pie—1 lb. hamburger, 1 medium onion, 4 tablespoons catsup, 1 cup hot water, 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper. Method: Fry onion in bacon grease until done, then add meat and cook until done. Add water or soup stock seasonings and thicken with flour. Pour into

baking dish and cover with biscuits. Bake 20 minutes at 475 degrees.

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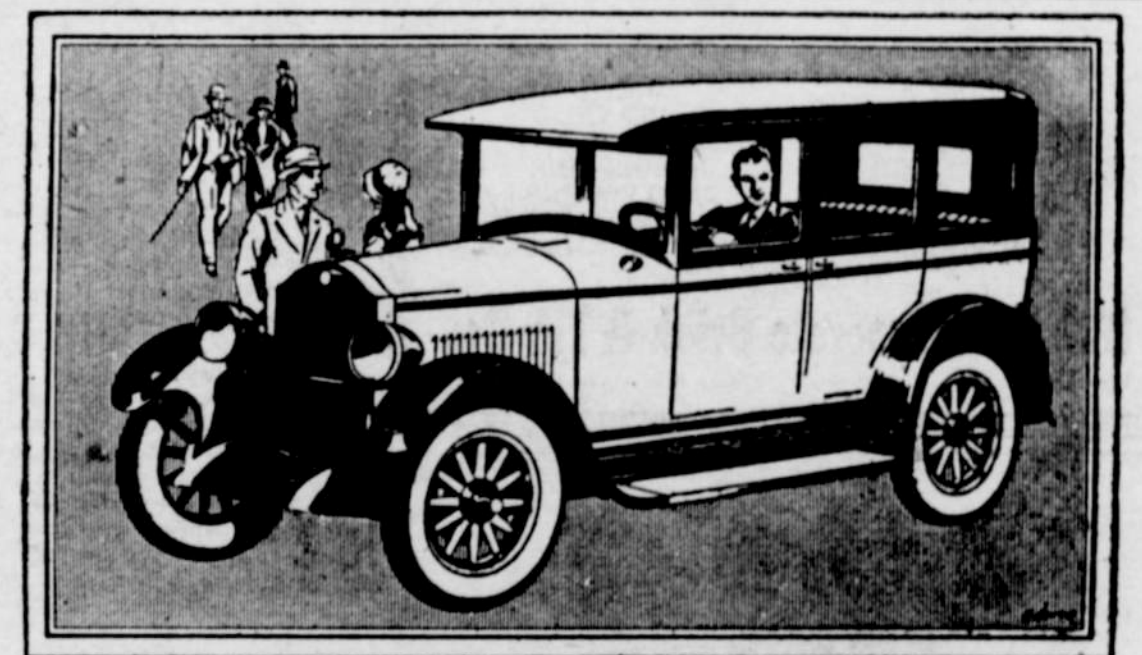
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
