Timely Hints on Topics of Value To Farm Listed

"If grain in Washington county is to be harvested in the future with small combined threshers as is indicated by the trend this year, then farmers had best grow Jenkins Club wheat because it does not shatter so easily and can be left until it is quite ripe," said E. N. Bressman of the O. A. C. farm crops department at the meeting at the grain nursery on the farm of George Biersdorf, last Friday.

Jenkins Club wheat has proven to be the best producer in college tests the past four years and was the highest in the county agent's grain nursery on the Milne farm at North Plains last season.

Utah winter barley is also proving out in tests in the county and at O. A. C. to be the better winter variety. Madrid oats, a spring variety brought into this country by the O. A. C. experiment station about three years ago, is out-yielding all other spring oats now on trial.

Thirty varieties of wheat, 14 varieties of oats, and 12 varieties of barleys, including hybrids, are on trial at the Biersdorf farm this year in conjunction with the experiment station work at the Oregon Agricultural college. These trials will be harvested by O. T. McWhorter, the county agent, and threshed at Corvallis in order to get comparative variety yields.

Sulphur for Clover Mildew
George Biersdorf of Shefflin and E. A. Rueter of Forest Grove will use finely powdered sulphur on clover this year to test its value in clover mildew control. Ten to 25 pounds of sulphur per acre have been used with success in Malheur and Josephine counties for the control of this clover disease. The sulphur is dusted on the clover just as the mildew begins to appear.

Ground Lime Rock
Those wanting ground lime rock from the state lime plant at Salem should put in their orders now. The sacked lime costs \$5.50 per ton at Salem. A deposit of \$2.00 per ton is required on the sacks which is refunded on return of sacks in good condition. Farmers can place carload orders direct with the state lime plant and in case of less than carload orders, the county agent will try to get pooled carload lot orders assembled.

Ground lime rock should be applied in the fall for the following year's crops whenever possible to do so. Again shipments are more apt to get immediate delivery in the fall of the year, as many wait until spring to place their orders.

Cultivate Alfalfa
Alfalfa should be cultivated after each cutting to keep out weeds and loosen the top soil. Use a regular alfalfa cultivator, or if such an implement is not available, use the common spring tooth harrow. Cultivation of alfalfa fields is not new. It has been long practiced in old alfalfa growing sections, and is a necessity to the long life and productivity of alfalfa fields.

Acid or super-phosphate applied on Hillsboro loam series of soil in 1925 on the Charles Coppen farm at Hillsboro doubled the yield of alfalfa for two seasons. Other fertilizers might give the same result, but the results on this farm are nevertheless of interest to alfalfa growers. The alfalfa treated with acid phosphate appears more vigorous and its life may be increased thereby. Similar trials are being made at the following farms: Henry Beach, North Plains; Mrs. W. H. Lyda, Forest Grove; Mr. Vuylsteke at Banks, and Nicholas Kurth of Tigard.

Hearing on Depot Petition
The public service commission will hold a hearing here July 26 in the matter of the petition of patrons for the construction of a modern depot by the Southern Pacific in the city of Hillsboro.

Civil Service Test Here For Orenco Postoffice

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination to be held at Hillsboro as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Orenco, Oregon, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interest of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$1,099 for the last fiscal year.
