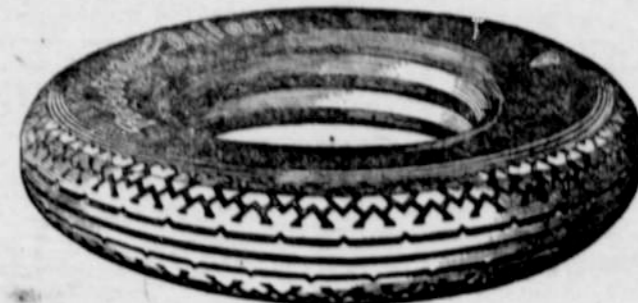

Of twin calves, one male and one female, the female is known as a free-martin heifer, and as a rule will not reproduce, says the O. A. C. dairy department. They usually come into heat regularly and take service, but do not conceive, having incomplete reproductive organs. At

no time it was thought there is no exception to this general rule, but occasional exceptions are found. Since not more than 5 or 10 per cent bear young a grower is not justified in keeping free-martins with the idea that they will reproduce.
