Biers to Serve Prison Term at Salem for Deed

Statutory Offense Results in a Six Year Sentence

Demurrer of City of Hillsboro In B. A. Barber Suit Is Sustained

Carl Frederick Biers was yesterday morning sentenced by Judge George R. Bagley in circuit court to serve six years in the state prison on two separate indictments of rape. The sentences are to run concurrently. He withdrew his plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty to both counts.

Lester Hewitt pleaded guilty to contributing to the delinquency of a minor after the jury had been selected.
