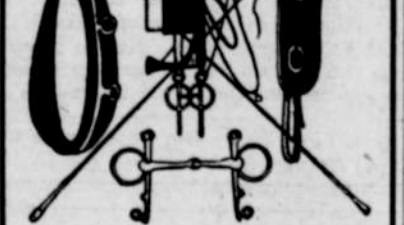
Miss Evelyn Hesse was home for the week-end.
