

Herman Prahl Dies Of Injuries Friday

Herman Prahl, 30, of near Hillsboro, was accidentally killed Friday at the K-P Timber camp at Kerry, Oregon, when he was chasing a high line. A coroner's jury brought in a verdict of death as the result of injuries. He had been working there for two months.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Glenn F. Bell mortuary with the Rev. H. A. Deck officiating. Interment was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

He was born at Grenfell, Minn., and came to Oregon with his parents when he was two years old, making his home on the farm near Hillsboro until shortly before his death when he went to Kerry to work in a camp. Mr. Prahl attended the Hillsboro schools and was a member of the Congregational church. He is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Ralph and Sylvester, Hillsboro; Waldemar, Camp Lewis, Wash.; Homer, Portland; Warner, Vancouver, Wash.; Mrs. John Scown, Vancouver, Wash.; and Mrs. Emma Jones, Baker.

Expand Electricity Through the County

Electrical service is being extended throughout Washington county by the Portland Electric Power company to such an extent that the proposed power line from Gaston to Newberg has been abandoned, according to R. R. Easter, division manager. Length of line and voltage conditions that would be encountered were factors in the abandonment.

Instead, the loop will be closed within the county and accomplish the same results in half the distance and double the line to reach to the farthest point. It will start at Beaverton, go through Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Banks, North Plains, Cedar Mills and thence back to Beaverton, which will give a feeder into all the north half of the county and thus allow service sooner. The line may later be doubled out of Portland to insure continuity of service.

Immediate extensions include Huber, North Plains, Rosedale, Tobias, Newton station, and prospective extensions are Gales Creek, Spring Hill, Helvetia and Dersham.
