Ground Limestone Available for Farm

(By O. T. McWhorter)

Ground limestone from the state lime plant is available for quick delivery this year as arrangements have been made by the plant to keep stored supplies on hand. Delivery has been made within four to six days after ordering carload lots.

The county agent now has a few pooled orders on hand for delivery at the following places: Sherwood, Forest Grove, and Hillsboro, but not enough to make a carload at any one point.

The price of the state lime in pooled orders is \$8.45 per ton f. o. b. cars at the above points. When sacks are returned in good condition, \$2 per ton will be refunded.

The greater part of the lime shipped in to the county is used on alfalfa land at the rate of one ton per acre applied on the plowed ground and worked into the soil by harrowing.
