

Narcissus Day Set for April

All persons interested in bulb culture are cordially invited to visit and inspect these plots on this special Narcissus day, Thursday, April 12. Someone will be at the plots from 10 a. m. on through the day to explain the experimental work being conducted. Visitors who know the location of the plots may come directly to the farm. The plots are on the same farm (Linn Experiment Farm) as last year, but in a different field, about one-fourth mile from the barn. Others may inquire at room 235, Agricultural building, O. A. C. campus, for directions to the field.

The following are the points of interest that will be under observation:

- Effects of hot water treatment on growth of Narcissus.
- Treatments for Nematode Control, Narcissus grey disease.
- Treatments for greater and lesser fly control.
- Tulip experimental plots.
- A small collection of bulbous iris, showing variable amounts of the mosaic disease, will be available for inspection.
- Three or four auto loads of local bulb growers are planning to go to Corvallis in attendance at this field day. By leaving at 7 or 7:30 a. m., plenty of time is allowed to arrive at the O. A. C. experimental ground by 10 a. m.

Plans for the fifth annual interstate high school music tournament are rapidly taking shape. The tournament is scheduled for April 27 and 28 in Marsh hall, Pacific university. It is given under the auspices of the conservatory of music with Samuel Miller Callahan, dean, in charge, and the Forest Grove chamber of commerce.

Programs have been sent out to all the high schools of the northwest, and it is expected that the number of contestants this year will reach the one thousand mark, which will be about 200 more than last year. A number of trophies, certificates of merit, and victory tokens will be given as prizes to winners. The divisions, rules and regulations are the same as last year.

P. U. Endowment Is Nearing Completion
