A. Frost of Watts, Assessor W. F. Boley is opposed for the republican nomination by J. E. Wewton of near Forest Grove. H. I. Patten of Hillsboro is contesting the republican nomination for recorder with the present incumbent, James H. Davis, of North Plains.

Constable Job Popular  
No justice of the peace is to be elected in the Hillsboro district, but three are in the race for constable. Fred Schendel, incumbent, is opposed by Walter Tews, former Hillsboro night officer and present fire chief, and Columbus Medlock. The candidates for central committees are as scarce as hen's teeth, and names will have to be written in.

Three nominees for representative are to be selected from among Charles R. LaFollett, incumbent, of Cornelius, Dr. T. L. Perkins, R. Frank Peters, and L. E. Wilkes, all of Hillsboro, and Dr. J. R. Talbert of Beaverton.

Edward Schulmerich, Hillsboro banker, is opposed by L. M. Graham of Forest Grove for state senator. C. J. Edwards of Tillamook is up for joint senator, and is opposed by Earl E. Fisher of Beaverton. Edwards was a Hillsboro visitor Friday.

Judge George R. Bagley of Hillsboro has opposition to the republican nomination for circuit judge in C. R. Chapin of Tillamook. E. B. Tongue is unopposed for district attorney.

Candidates for delegates to the republican convention are A. W. Schaupt, Robert N. Stanfield, W. L. Thompson, Elisha A. Baker, L. N. Blowers, William A. Carter, Floyd J. Cook, Lane Goodell, Russell Hawkins, E. V. Hover, Dorr E. Keasey, Fred E. Kiddle, Sam A. Kozer, Levi T. Pennington, S. D. Peterson and L. B. Sandblast. Seven are to be selected from this group. Convention delegates from this district are Carl Blirup, Hal D. Patton

and Edgar J. Adams, two to be chosen.

Herbert Hoover is the only republican presidential candidate, and the three vice-presidential candidates are John H. Hall of Oregon, William Grant Webster and Hamilton Fish, Jr. Candidates for electors, five to be chosen, are Mrs. Charles E. Runyon, H. J. Warner, Charles H. Carey, John L. Day and Robert B. Kuykendall.

Congressman W. C. Hawley is having some energetic opposition from James W. Mott, Thomas B. Handley, Hal E. Hoss and H. H. Corey are making a tight race for secretary of state. Two nominees for supreme court justice are to be selected from John L. Rand, who was last week given a clean bill of health after an attack by George W. Joseph and the Telegram, L. H. McMahon and George Rossmann.

J. D. Mickle of this county for state dairy and food commissioner, Thomas B. Kay for state treasurer, and I. H. VanWinkle for attorney general, are unopposed for the republican nominations.

Democratic candidates for national convention delegates from the state at large are W. A. Wood, George L. Curry, W. A. Delsell, Ashby C. Dickson, Bert E. Haney, John Manning, Hugh McLain, Daniel W. Sheehan, Harvey G. Starkweather, Frank B. Tiehenor, R. R. Turner, Elton Watkins and Louise Palmer Weber. First district can-

didates for delegates to the democratic convention, two to be selected, are W. H. Canon, Daniel J. Fry, R. A. Harris and O. Henry Olsen. James A. Reed, Alfred E. Smith, Thomas J. Walsh and Alonzo F. Workman are seeking the democratic presidential nomination. Milton A. Miller of Oregon is a candidate for vice-president.

The Leisyville school will close Friday. Plans are being made to hold a picnic at Balm Grove the following Sunday.

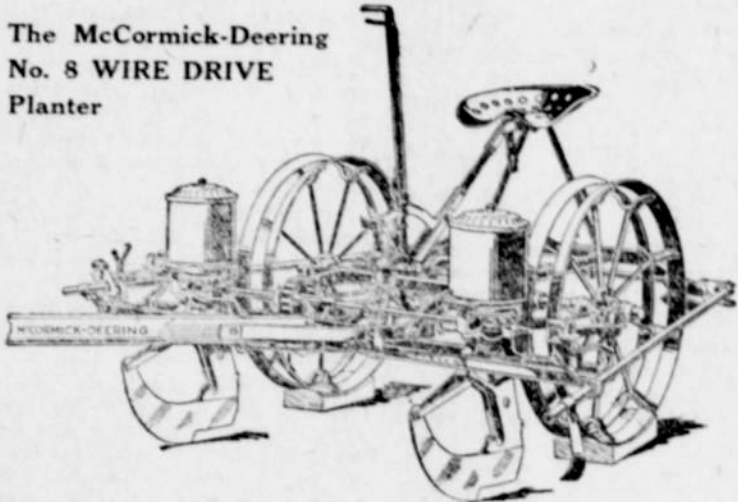
