

The distance is somewhat less than 20 miles, with a paved highway the entire distance. The contest will be conducted under championship walking rules and any person in good physical condition will be allowed to enter. State, county and Portland traffic officers will patrol the highway. A number of entries from Portland and also some from Washington county have been made and the list of entries will be published next week.
