(Celebrate Here) — P. O. BROWN Perry O. Brown, aged 80 years, died Sunday evening at the Masonic Home at Forest Grove, after an extended illness.

Mr. Brown was born in New York

on February 14, 1848, and was married to Miss Irene Abbott in Iowa on June 25, 1878. They came to Hillsboro about 30 years ago, and for several years Mr. Brown was in the undertaking business in this city. With the exception of a year spent on a homestead in eastern Oregon, Mr. Brown had made his home since then in Hillsboro and Portland, going to the Masonic Home last year on account of failing health.

He is survived by the widow and two children, Mrs. Esther Latham of Portland and Finis Brown of Kalama, Wash. One son, Lemuel, died about a year ago at Concrete, Wash. He is also survived by several brothers in Iowa.

Mr. Brown had been a Mason for about 50 years, having joined in Iowa. Later he transferred to the Hillsboro lodge, where he held his membership until his death.

The funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 at the Forest Grove Undertaking parlors, James Welch, superintendent of the Masonic Home officiating. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery at Forest Grove, with Tuality lodge A. F. & A. M. in charge.

Apply Cherry Fruit Fly Spray at Once

Don C. Mote, Entomologist The sweetened poison bait spray for the cherry fruit fly should be applied now. The formula for the preparation of the poison bait is as follows: Lead arsenate— $\frac{1}{2}$ pound. Molasses or syrup (never honey) —2 quarts. Water—10 gallons. This amount is sufficient for spraying approximately 50 trees. From one pint to one quart of solution to the tree is enough. Three spray applications are given. The second application is made 7 to 10 days after the first, and the third 7 days after the second. Two applications might suffice this year in case no showers or rain occur. In early cherries, such as Royal Annes, one application will suffice. Apply the solution in fine droplets to the upper surface of the outer leaves of the cherry trees and adjacent trees and shrubs.
