Poultry Culling Is A Continuous Task

No one season of the year is the season for culling the poultry flock. Instead proper culling is a continuous process by which the practical poultryman watches for unprofitable fowls 365 days out of the year. This, at least, is the conclusion of H. E. Cosby, extension specialist in poultry husbandry, whose revised bulletin, "Culling a Poultry Flock" has just been issued by the Oregon extension service.

In addition to this continuous culling, one or more systematic examinations of the entire flock are made, usually from June to August inclusive. After this general culling, select breeding hens are chosen from those remaining, usually be-

tween the middle of September and the middle of October.

"Culling begins at the time eggs are selected for incubation," points out Mr. Cosby. "Weak, malformed and undesirable chicks are culled when transferred from the incubator to the brooder. Chicks of low vitality are further eliminated as soon as discovered during the developing period, and pullets starting to lay a few months later than the average of the flock are next culled out. Culling is thus a continuous 365-day watching for unprofitable hens."

Mr. Cosby discusses the factors in culling such as vigor and health, yellow pigment in the skin, molt, body changes, head and face, and

temperament. He warns against depending on any one factor, however.

"It is not safe to judge a hen solely by any one of the indications mentioned," he says. "Such procedure will result in untold errors. Only when all indications are applied to each hen can intelligent judgment be passed."

"Culling is an intelligent comparison between hens of the same flock having equal opportunity as far as housing, feeding and management are concerned. No one set of rules applies to all flocks."

Want Land Leases For Oil Drilling

An effort is being made to secure 4,000 acres for oil leases near Hillsboro. Mr. Schlieff, German geologist, has gone over the land and has explained to a group of business men that he is confident that there is oil formation south of the city.

He said that the first well would cost about \$150,000, and that it would put Hillsboro on the map. The leases call for a one-twelfth royalty, for the completion of the well when oil or gas is found in

commercial quantities. The leases also provide that crop damages are paid, that taxes against improvements are paid, and that the farmer can cultivate all lands.

Caponizing fowls by means of but one slit reduces the tendency to "wind puffs" which frequently result from this operation, reports W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist at the Oregon station, in answer to a question from a poultryman. These

wind puffs also follow jagged incisions made in an operation. They are more or less harmless unless so big as to cause the fowl inconvenience, in which case they may be stopped by making a three-cornered skin incision to release the air.
