Many people from here were in Forest Grove yesterday purchasing school books.

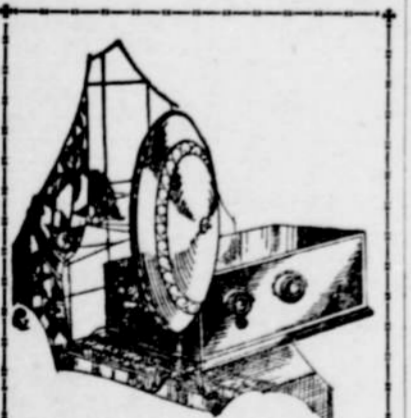

Staggering Amount Spent for Service

Motorists of the nation spend the staggering sum of more than five billion dollars annually with service stations and repair shops, according to F. C. Stettler, treasurer of the Oregon State Motor association for the past ten years, which is affiliated with the American Automobile association.

"This gigantic sum," he continued, "was divided as follows: Parts and service supplies, \$950,000,000; tires for replacement, \$925,000,000; fuels and lubricants, \$2,350,000,000; service labor, \$1,092,000,000. In 1919 the total amount was \$2,125,000,000, while in 1926 it reached the sum of \$4,815,000,000."

Mr. Stettler declared that every repair shop in the United States has an average clientele of 261 motor cars. This statement is based on the 1927 motor vehicle registrations and a total of \$9,055 service stations and repair shops.
