

Auto Theft Is Charge Faced

Harold Emrick, 17, and Dean Thompson, 17, Hillsboro youths, were taken into custody Sunday night at The Dalles on charges from the sheriff's office here. They are charged with larceny, involving the theft of an automobile belonging to Otto Johnston here September 19. The two boys, say officers, claim that they paid a man in a Burnside street restaurant in Portland \$10 for the use of the car to go to the Pendleton Round-up. Chief Deputy Sheriff Virgil Weckert says the boys drove out of the state twice, while at Pendleton, and that he had notified federal authorities, who might possibly prosecute. Both boys have training school records. Other week-end arrests and the charges are as follows: Guy Cook, assault and battery, Seefeld, Thursday; F. W. Lewis, Portland, assault and battery, Friday; Florence Middleton and C. J. Roseland, booze and lewd and lascivious cohabitation, and Harry Mann, Tigard, larceny, Friday. Aileen Fitzpatrick was held as a material witness against Lewis, Edward Ambrose, Ernest Alfano and Meyer Swerdlik were held for investigation, and when freed they were allowed to take the Lewis car into Portland, where police officers discovered that it was an embezzled car. Joseph Strunk and W. I. Rausch of Portland were held on liquor charges following an accident near Huber Saturday night. The rear of their car struck a machine driven by H. E. Prink of Huber. Rausch suffered a bad cut on the right cheek.

Return Pastor To Local Place

That the chamber of commerce of Hillsboro has influence in other lines than that of commercial interests is evidently seen in the fact that telegrams were sent to Bishop Titus Lowe, presiding over the Methodist annual conference at Hood River, requesting the return of Rev. E. B. Lockhart to this city, as Mr. Lockhart stated yesterday that the bishop said he had received two telegrams from Hillsboro and asked the preacher if he had any friends in the chamber of commerce. He did not state from whom the telegrams were received, but it is interesting to note that some of the business men were considering some such move. Mr. Lockhart has been returned to this charge for another year after having been requested to accept the superintendency of the Alaska district of the Puget Sound conference, a position carrying with it a salary of \$3,000 and all expenses paid from the time he left the parsonage at Hillsboro. This position was kept open for Mr. Lockhart two days during the conference when a delegation consisting of Rev. D. M. Shannon and F. O. Eagon of the Oregon Land company arrived at the seat of conference to press the claim of the Hillsboro church and urge the return of the local man. These men went before the bishop and his cabinet with the result that Mr. Lockhart decided to turn down the very alluring offer of the district superintendency. In Alaska he would have lived at Juneau as pastor of the church there, and would have been required to visit the other churches once a year. His term of service would have been from three to five years.
