Ninety per cent of the farmers in Washington county could with profit add a few more cows to their herds, according to George S. Bulkley, di-rector of dairy extension and field work for the Carnation Milk Products company, in the five western states. W. C. Theda, chairman, urged that the farmer save his young stock.

Dairying Profitable Dairying is profitable here, but many have not taken it up because so far they have been able to get by on growing wheat or other cover crops rather than to tie themselves up for 365 days in the year, the speaker pointed out. Mr. Bulkley said he knew of no other line that would be as profitable to the farmer


