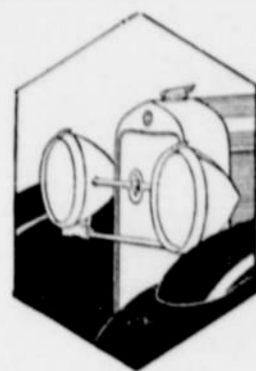
a silo. He was buried at Fargo, Idaho. Three children survive.
