

Forest Trees Ready For Distribution

About half a million little forest trees at the Oregon Forest Nursery are ready for distribution among the ranchers of Oregon. The following species are available: black locust, green ash, box elder, Russian mulberry, western yellow pine, Douglas fir, and western red cedar. Any of these trees should be well west of the Cascades. All except the last two are suited to planting in eastern Oregon.

The Oregon Forest Nursery is maintained jointly by the State Board of Forestry and the Federal Forest Service. The planting stock, under the law, is for use among the ranchers of the state for shelterbelt and woodland planting, and cannot be used for ornamental planting. The stuff is now one and two years old. Consequently it is small, but on that account is easy to handle and inexpensive to transport. West of the Cascades the little trees can be planted at any time during the winter or spring when the ground can be worked. East of the mountains the material should go in the ground as early as the soil can be worked in the spring.

Silver Medal for a High Production Cow

Forest Grove, Dec. 13.—The high yield of 555.51 pounds of butterfat and 9,864 pounds of milk has just won an American Jersey Cattle club silver medal for Lad's St. Mawes Alice 608762, a Jersey cow owned by David Storey of Forest Grove. This record was made in an official production test of 305 days. Lad's St. Mawes Alice was started on this test when she was 3 years and 10 months of age, and carried calf for 196 days of the time. During one of the months her yield totaled 6.17 pounds of butterfat and for six months of the test she produced more than fifty pounds of butterfat.

This fine cow was sired by La Belle's Girl's St. Mawes Lad, a bull that has been awarded a silver medal because of the excellent records of his nine tested daughters. Her dam is St. Mawes Rosaire Lad's Alice.

Mr. Storey, the owner of the new silver medal cow, has done a great deal of production testing and has a number of cows in his Jersey herd with exceptional records.

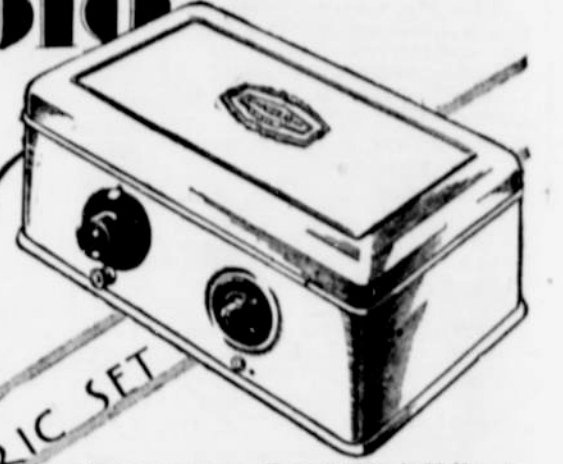

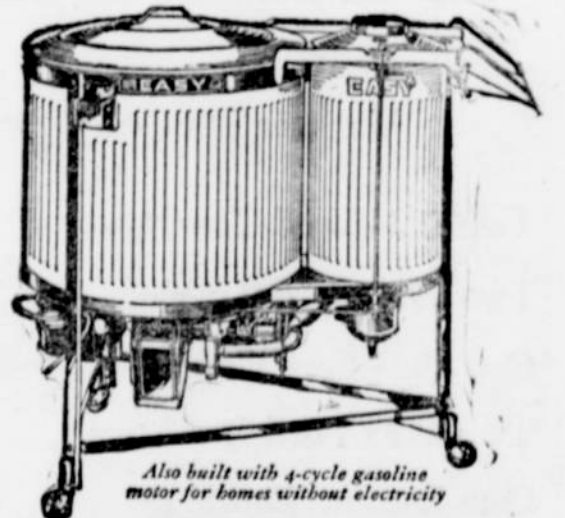
