### AMENDMENTS COME BEFORE OREGON FOLK

tion of state. It is also to extend privilege of loans to Spanish American, Philippine and Boxer war veterans serving between February 14, 1898, and July 4, 1902; reduce loan limit from \$4000 to \$5000; widow or dependent father or mother of any person who has died (whether in service or not at time of death) and who has not received loan entitled to, to be made eligible to loan. Also to extend loans to persons not residents of Oregon at time of enlistment or induction, who have been bona fide residents for 10 years continuously prior to application for loan, interest on such loans to exceed by

one-half per cent the rate of interest on state bonds. To be submitted at the General election of November, 1930, is the Macpherson amendment for cabinet form of government.

S. J. R. 16—is to add two new sections, 19 and 20, to article 5 of the constitution. It provides that administrative functions of state are to be exercised by governor with assistance of nine departments: (1) Agriculture, (2) Labor and Industry, (3) Financial administration, (4) Commerce, (5) Education, (6) Public works and domain, (7) Health and public welfare, (8) State police and military affairs, (9) Legal affairs. All officers and commissions except governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, are to be abolished July 1, 1931, and duties transferred to said departments by law. Department of education shall be in charge of nine directors to be appointed by governor with consent of senate.

If no special election is caused, all seven of these constitutional amendments will be before the people at the November election of 1930.

Salem—"We won't get any place hiding our light under a

half bushel basket and then have the whole family sit on it for fear some one will turn it over and see the light," declared Senator Edward Schumacher, Hillsboro, in supporting H. R. 411 before it passed the senate. The bill provides \$25,000 for use by the state chamber of commerce in advertising Oregon.

"There are more natural resources and beauties in Oregon than California. Yet look how progressive they are. California receives millions a year from tourists and hasn't as much to give them as we have," he concluded.

Salem, March 6—The tunnel bill introduced by Senator Earl Fisher of Washington county was killed in the house after passing the senate. Representative R. Frank Peters presented the arguments for the bill.

The Multnomah delegation was divided on the matter, Representative Homer D. Angell, Earl C. Bronaugh, Jr., and Wilber Henderson opposed the bill while Gust Anderson, Barnett H. Goldstein, and Neil Malarkey spoke in favor of it.

S. B. 94 was introduced by Senator Fisher to take the place of the 1921 tunnel district law

which was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court on the grounds that it confiscated property.

Salem—Mrs. L. E. Wilkes, of Hillsboro, drove to Salem Friday to be present for the last two days of the legislative session. She was accompanied by Steve Cox, also of Hillsboro. Representative Wilkes returned home with them.

A delegation of Hillsboro business men attended the state legislature last Thursday. Members of the group were: R. E. Easter, Dr. C. A. Lamkin, E. J. McAlear, Dr. T. L. Perkins, J. M. Person, W. V. McKinney and E. L. Moore. All were particularly interested in the road legislation which was up for consideration.

Salem, March 6—The 150 miles of new highway between Portland, the Roosevelt Coast Military highway and the Pacific ocean asked in S. J. R. 7, will not be constructed by permission of this session of the legislature. The resolution was killed in the senate by a vote of 17 to 13.

ton, speaking for the measure said: "I am speaking for the human rights, not the property rights. There are many poor people in Tillamook county in the dairy business who need this road to get their produce to market."

Salem, March 6—"The tax program is the best legislation ever passed since Oregon was a state," Representative Charles R.

LaFollett, Cornelius, said of the 1929 legislature.

"This is one of the most constructive sessions we have ever had. Much more has been accomplished than usual and a large number of the measures have been of great importance," LaFollett declared. "I have never seen so many important things come before the house at one session before."
