### Need Of Funds Is Found Everywhere

In every community, practically without exception, there are cases arising every day in which people of average means suddenly find themselves in need of funds larger than they possess, according to Charles Walker, local branch manager for the Oregon Industrial Loan company. This need is basic and will always exist.

William King, director of sales, who is here with several men, says that years ago, and in some states even at the present time, the people who faced a need for small sums of money to meet unexpected circumstances were forced to place themselves at the mercy of "money bootleggers." Legitimate credit sources, such as commercial banks, he pointed out, were unable to profitably make all classes of personal loans and could not consistently help these small borrowers. Statistics in this country, show that approximately 85 per cent of our population is without banking privileges in the matter of borrowing small sums, except for the existence of industrial loan companies in the various states of the union, including Oregon, that are supervised by the state.
