Tax Problem Will Clean Up State Deficit
Work Called Sincere Representative Struck By Attempts To Regulate In Many Ways

The legislature is far from being a picnic and there is plenty of work, in the opinion of Representative E. Frank Peters, who addressed the forum luncheon of the local chamber of commerce Monday noon.

Breeds Contempt Mr. Peters was struck most forcibly at the recent session by the mania for regulation. Bills were introduced, he said, to regulate acts, public and private, of individuals, and which, if passed, would not have been enforced, thereby causing a disregard for all law.

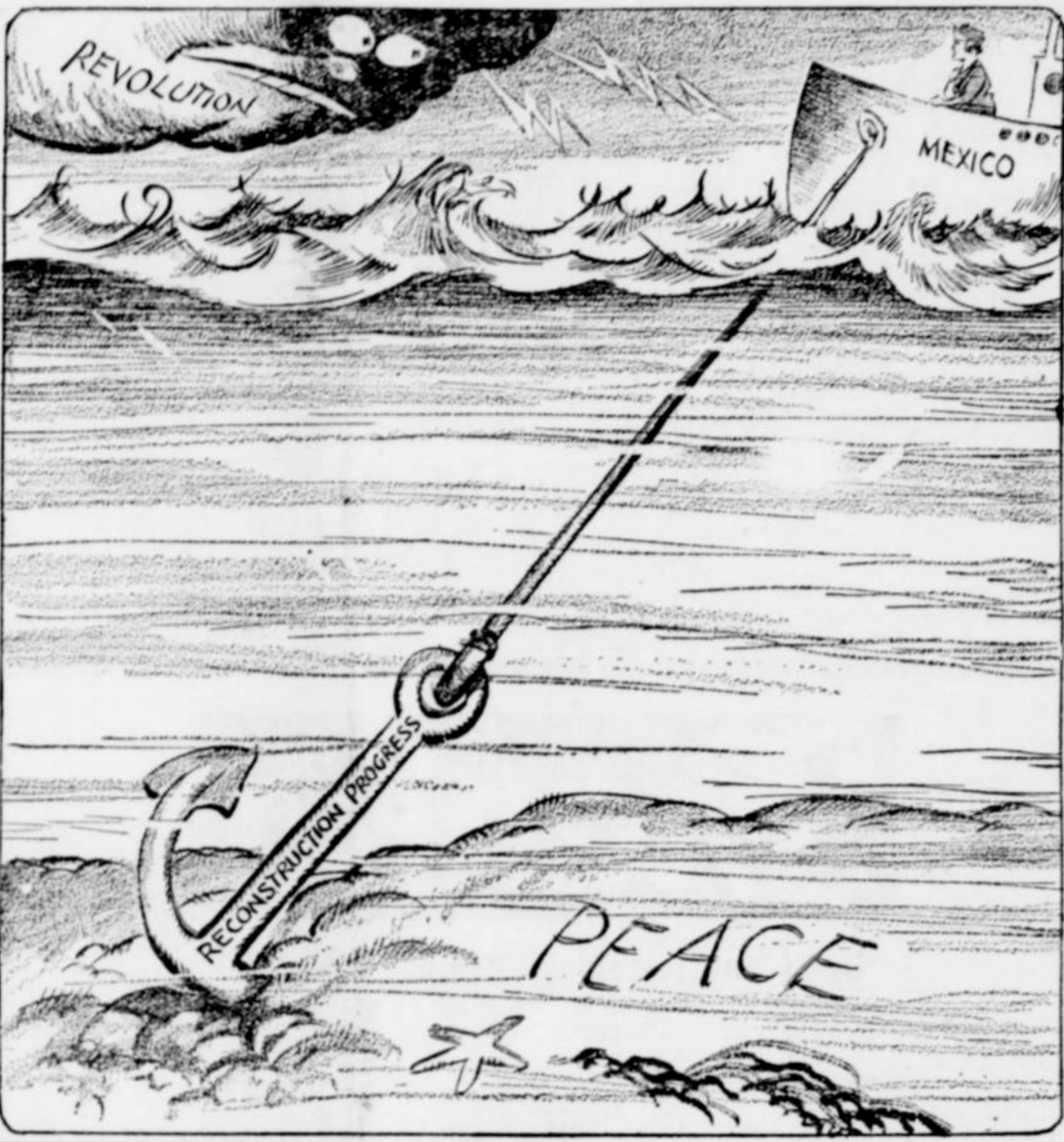
