Hard Variety Clover Needed

Willamette valley red clover seed, the crop which has played an important part in lifting many Washington county mortgages, is being rejected by certain parts of the east as being non-hardy and unsuited for continued use as seed in those sections. The discrimination against Willamette valley red clover seed is apt to grow rather than diminish until such time as suitable or hardy varieties can be established locally and the same grown under inspection and verified as to hardiness. The procedure may not be practical. Trial will prove or disprove this plan.

However, the production of Tennessee anthracnose resistant red clover for the southern trade may be developed. To this end 520 pounds of this seed was secured for E. F. Burlingham & Son of Forest Grove, who have arranged for Ritchie Bros. of Forest Grove to plant the same. One hundred pounds was secured from the farm crop department of O. A. C. and will be handled by the county agent for the purpose of securing a local stock for redistribution.

Fred Beach of North Plains was the first to plant Tennessee anthracnose resistant seed and made a small planting last year.

John Koppin of Gaston planted five acres of a hardy type of eastern Oregon red clover in 1928. Other farmers who made small plantings of red clover of so-called hardy types in 1928 were: Gus Krause, Blooming; John Kamma, Jr., Farmington; and J. R. Pablos, Jr., Helvetia.

Do Our Best At All Times, Advises Man

Last year 122,000 boys throughout the United States took part in the series. The rules provide for 14 players on a team between the ages of 12 and 17, and there are city, county, state, sectional and national series.
