Use Much Rock On Road Improvement

Laurel.—Nearly 5000 yards of rock will be taken from the Laurel quarry this year for road improvement in this community on roads leading toward Hillsboro and Scholls, as well as some lateral roads leading into these.

Fences are being moved back along the market road to be constructed between Laurel and Scholls. It was formerly a 40-foot road, but property owners have donated 10 feet on either side to make it a 60-foot road.

Clearing along the right of way is now in progress and one of the county outfits will soon commence grading.

Hurt In Auto Wreck Helen Keatons of Beaverton suffered an injured arm in an automobile accident on the highway at Witch Hazel Saturday.

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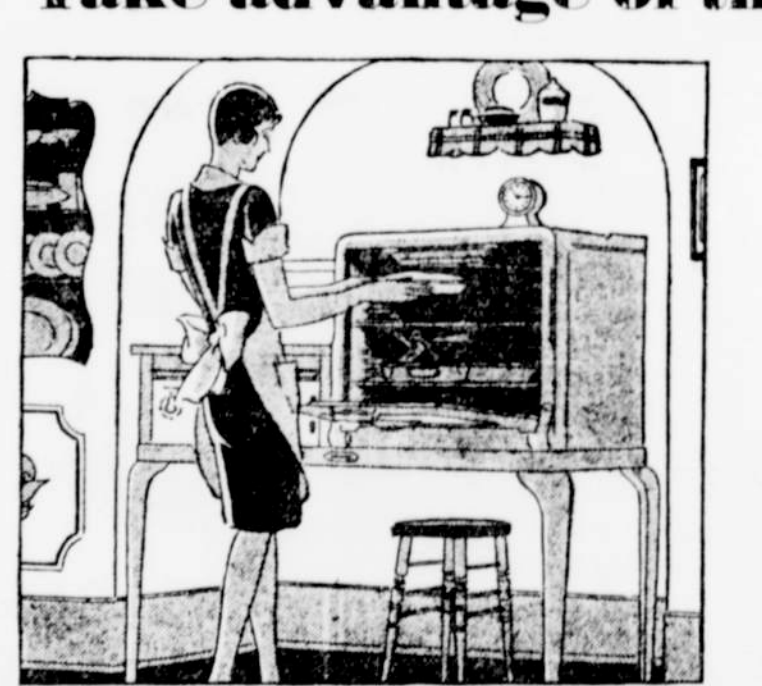
