

### Annual Church Meet At Grove

Leaders of the Congregational churches in the United States will be present at the 81st annual meeting of the Congregational conference of Oregon, to be held in First church, Forest Grove, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week. One of the features of this year's conference meeting will be the prominent place on the program given to laywomen and women ministers of the denomination.

The meeting will begin at 3 p. m. Tuesday and the first session will be a devotional one, including a communion service and the annual conference sermon, to be delivered this year by the Rev. John F. Danstan, pastor of Highland church, Portland. The annual conference dinner will be held at 6 o'clock, at which time there will be the introduction of new ministers in the state, all of whom will respond to toasts.

Among the clergy who have come to Oregon within the year is Pastor Henry S. Haller of the Hillsboro church. On Tuesday evening, at 7:30, following music by the chorus choir of the Forest Grove church, there will be addresses by Miss Manche Irene Langley, president of the Women's State Bar association, and Dr. Frank L. Moore of Denver, Col., western secretary of missions for the denomination.

On Wednesday morning, after the business session, there will be missionary addresses by Miss Helen B. Calder, home secretary of the American board, and chairman of the foreign missions conference of more than 100 denominational groups of the United States and Canada, and ex-Governor William E. Sweet of Colorado, associate moderator of the national council. Separate sessions of the men and women will be held in the afternoon, and after a fellowship dinner at 6 o'clock the Rev. Fred R. Morrow of Corvallis will discuss the Kellogg peace pact, and Miss Calder will again talk on missions in the near east.

Thursday sessions will be in the interests of religious education, with professors of the University of Oregon and of Pacific university speaking. The conference will close with the dinner of the Congregational club at 6:30, at which ex-Governor Sweet will speak on "The Church and World Peace." Many Congregational people from Hillsboro will attend the sessions, particularly the Thursday evening dinner.

## "It's the Little Things That Count"

CLEVER INCIDENTALS ARE WHAT MAKE STYLES WHAT THEY ARE THIS SPRING—USE OF PLAIDS WITH PLAIN GOODS IS INSTANCE

ASIDE from line and textiles, it is the little things that count in making spring clothes the charming things they are this year.

The use of figured fabrics with plain, the hand-sewing with color inserted into plain fabrics, the bits of lace, embroidery, grosgrain ribbon and no on are tremendously varied and stimulating, viewing collections of early spring things.

The use of plaids with plain materials is one of the season's achievements. Also the use of dots of one kind or another, particularly if they are some unusual kinds of dots.

These Are Different

I am showing this week two different ensembles for spring that make use of individual kinds of decoration, very different in character but equally effective.

On the left is shown a black heavy velvet coat with gold nailheads for decoration, topping a black satin frock that dips both front and back.

This coat is very new, with an all-over pattern of square gold nailheads, except for a plain border around the bottom and the sleeves.

The stunning feature is the application of the nailheads. There are three gold scallops in braid, with the nailheads concentrated near them, like a triple-tiered skirt to the coat. In fact, viewing this coat from the distance, one would swear that it had three gleaming ruffles, with the scalloped edges in gold. The cuff features the same curved treatment, and so does the collar. This type of coat can be copied in braid and hand-made dots in color and would be tremendously effective done that way. Tans and browns or two shades of blue or green would be very good.

Hat Is Interesting

Atop this costume sits a little chapeau straight from Paris that is new and stunning in its interpretation of the tricorne motif. It has a crown of black felt and a flange of black braid. The front of the straw flange points upward.

The second costume is far more informal but equally smart. It is a tan kasha suit of pleated, skirt and long coat with a tuck-in blouse and scarf of tan, dark and

light green and cream-colored plaid crepe. The tuck-in blouse has a one-sided neckline and full sleeves gathered into tight cuffs. But the scarf matching it is quite unusual in the way it goes outside the coat, slips through three slits in the coat and hangs almost to the skirt's bottom edge. It can be tied in a bow if one wishes, though it is quite graceful swinging.

The hat chosen for this outfit is a tan one, matching the suit, with a one-sided brim that rolls up decidedly on one side and down

on the other. There is a novelty banding inserted in the crown, of matching straw, outlined with green. This gives a perfect touch for the plaid trim of the suit.

The purse of dark green calfskin is one of the chic new colorful bags that will be so good this year. There is a watch inserted in its clasp, a little conceit that is much appreciated by the woman who can afford luxuries.

For either of these costumes the conventional pump or the new smart laced oxford in suede are excellent.

Considerable interest is manifested in Oregon at this time in the growing of beets for canning purposes. An important consideration is using the right number of pounds of seed per acre. This will vary, of course, with the distance between the rows. As a general rule, five to seven pounds are used per acre when the rows are 24 inches apart. Thinning the plants is undesirable from the cost standpoint, hence the importance of observing the thickness of seeding, says the experiment station.

Proper lubrication of farm machinery is necessary even in the busiest season, if depreciation is to be minimized and poor service avoided, says the experiment station. Because farm machines must of necessity be built light and sold at a low cost, bearings are generally small and not always protected from dust and grit.

Black, white and navy will be the standard colors for summer wear. When combining colors the contrast is used rather than the blending of color.
