FEEL NORTH PART COUNTY SHOULD BE REPRESENTED

Editor The Argus:

Much interest is being taken in the north end of the county in the coming election. Since the county has now consolidated into one road district the people feel that the north half should be entitled to one county commissioner. The North Plains Commercial club endorsed H. D. Kerkman for that office some time ago and numerous meetings are now being held in the interest of his candidacy. The people have known him as road supervisor of this district for the past eight years and know him to be a practical road builder, fair, honest and efficient and thoroughly familiar with the duties of county commissioner and the workings of the county court.
