Lafayette Dooley, 74, former Banks resident, died at Bonner's Ferry, Idaho, January 9 and funeral services will be held from the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the home of Dr. O. H. Holmes who officiate and interment will be in the Banks cemetery.

Mr. Dooley was born at Fresno, Cal., July 16, 1859, coming here with his parents in 1860. He left Banks August 25, 1893, and had been in Idaho and Montana since that time. He was in the mining business for many years, but of late years had been employed by the U. S. forest service at Troy, Mont. Deceased is survived by a sister, Mrs. Matilda J.
