Some difference of opinion exists among state house observers as to whether Governor Meier or State Treasurer Holman came off victorious in the jousting bout between these two officials at the board of control meeting this week. The first, incidentally, since last November, Holman had been trying for months to bring about a regular schedule of board meetings, but had met defeat at every turn because the governor refused to call a meeting of the board at which Holman could bring up his proposal. Last Friday when the board met Holman introduced a resolution providing for weekly sessions. Governor Meier as chairman of the board persisted in ignoring Holman's motion and Secretary of State Stadelman wishing to avoid participation in the feud between the two officials, pleaded neutrality with the situation and asked to be excused from committing himself on the problem for the time being. Holman, however, insisted on his motion by depriving him of any credit that might attach to the move the governor announced on the same day. Holman's motion would call the board together every Monday. So while Holman's motion failed for want of support it appears that he accomplished his purpose nevertheless.

In spite of the warning issued by Harry Hopkins, federal relief administrator, last September, Meier told Governor Meier that Oregon would receive no more federal money for direct relief until the state did something for its own unemployed. Uncle Sam continues to pour his funds into Oregon for direct relief. Word has just come to the governor's office that \$400,000 has been allocated to this state for February and March. Records in the executive department show that a total of \$5,041,288 in federal funds has been received by this state during 1933 for direct relief of needy unemployed. And in the meantime all that Oregon has done to comply with the demands of the federal government for state support of relief work has been to pass an appropriation based upon anticipated profits from liquor sales, an empty gesture at the best.

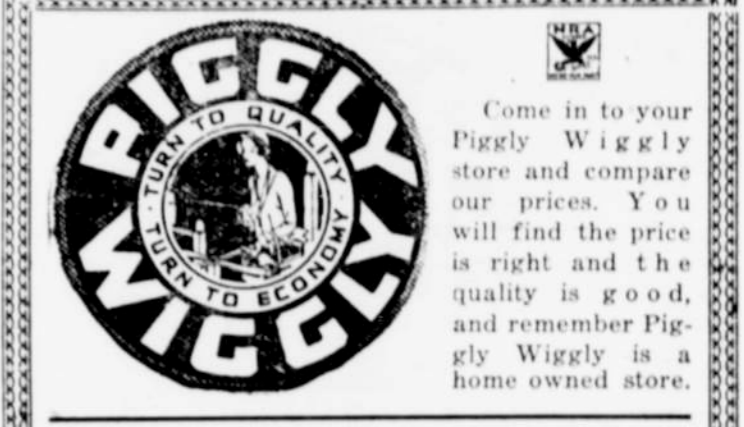
