buy from other sources in violation of the contract with the result that only about three-fourths of the Blue Ribbon company's need were purchased from the co-operative. The plaintiff declares that the contract breach was not discovered until March of this year. Defendants named in the suit are John Koppin, Robert Alexander, I. P. Brady, Will J. Hanev, David Storey, E. VanHassel, P. A. Waldron and Russell Koppin, all of Washington county, and George Sether and Christ E. Kraft of Clackamas county.

That a test case of the power of the Oregon State Liquor commission to cancel licenses under the Knox law will be made in the appeal of H. T. Giltner, Forest Grove, was the statement of George Neuner, commission attorney, following overruling of his demurrer for non-suit Saturday by Circuit Judge George R. Bagley. Neuner was given 10 days in which to file an answer to the appeal.

Declaring that a license had been prematurely issued to Giltner, Neuner pointed out that, subsequent to issuing the permit on March 12, the commission established the policy of granting licenses in towns where educational institutions are located without a request from the city council. Receiving no such request from the Forest Grove council and confronting conflicting sentiment from city residents, the commission cancelled Giltner's license. Neuner declared. He also pointed out that Forest Grove had voted dry at the last election.

William G. Hare, Hillsboro attorney, who with Edwin Graham of Forest Grove, represented Giltner, held that the commission had acted arbitrarily in cancelling the license. He declared that a personal privilege was being withheld without cause.

Giltner filed an appeal from the action of the commission March 21, declaring that he had been granted a class A package store license March 12 and that it had been cancelled without stated reasons five days later. He asked court action declaring the commission's cancelling order null and void and permitting him to sell beer.
