

C. A. Howard Talks Friday Tigid High

TIGARD—Commencement at the Tigid union high school will be held Friday evening in the school auditorium, with C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, giving the commencement address. Thomas H. Fowler, principal of the school, has announced that Tigid is graduating 49 students this year. Awards of scholarship and the honor of being the best all-around student will be announced at the exercises. Baccalaureate services were held in the high school auditorium Sunday evening, with Rev. Timothy Watson giving the address. Rev. E. C. Hicks and Rev. Alexander Hawthorne assisted.
