OREGON CITY—Certified White pine potatoes are being planted extensively by Clackamas county farmers this year as a result of information that this variety is in great demand in California where it is used to plant approximately 90 per cent of the potato acreage, reports County Agent J. J. Inskip.

This variety is popular, he says, because it stands rougher treatment than the Burbanks and yields about 100 sacks more per acre in the irrigated sections of California. While it is of poorer quality than the Burbank, people will not pay enough to compensate for the difference in yield, according to Inskip.
