Unusual features of Alaska were discussed by Rev. Henry Young, who spent a number of years in that intriguing country. The warmest day recorded in Alaska was first in the Arctic circle, while the coldest was south of that imaginary mark. The temperature reached 100 degrees at the bottom of the circle and 76 degrees below zero. The coldest ever recorded in Alaska was south of the circle.

The Alaskan coast line totals 27,000 miles, greater than the circumference of the earth, and greater than the coast line of the United States proper. It is estimated that 6,000,000 population of Alaska, 40,000 are white. The highest type of native comes from the Aleutian Islands, he believes.

Modern poles which dot native villages, represent fancy crests, he said. There are divisions for the men and women, with another division known as the "suntoten." When a native looks at a totem pole he can tell to what tribe it belongs.
