What Other Editors Say

Not Running Away

That prices are not running away from wages is shown in a nation-wide survey just released by the Standard Statistics Co., the purpose of which was to "ascertain whether the net purchasing power of the average worker has been enhanced by his higher remuneration," with special consideration for the result of the recent wave of wage increases.

"Analysis of the trend of recent price changes," says the survey "and their relation to all items contained in the average worker's expense budget, indicates that thus far (to April 19, 1934), he has had to bear an insignificant part of the higher cost burden. Food prices, where largest gains in prices already have occurred, account for only 30 per cent of average expenses; the increase in clothing prices effects 121/2 per cent."

More than 50 per cent of the worker's budget, the analysis discloses comprises shelter, fuel, insurance, medical care, car fare, and other miscellany in which costs are relatively fixed or price increases are "slow to penetrate." Many of the price advance burdens already had been assumed prior to the wage changes, so that the wage earner felt the benefit in an immediate increase in purchasing power.

These considerations lead to the conclusion as expressed in the survey that the 'expanding employment and increases in industrial wages are building up a firm background of increased buying power for moderate and sustained recovery."

The day is past, said Mr. Creel, when any man can do as he likes with his own business; that time-honored tradition is dead; he must consider his neighbor's business and business as a whole.

With this vivid picture sketched by Mr. Creel's inspiring imagination still before us, the NRA takes on the dignity and the majesty of a great forward movement to make human life—the life of all humans—safer, more livable, finer, more happy.—Pacific Printer and Publisher.




