April gasoline sales in Oregon exceeded those for the same month last year by 2,666,264 gallons and brought the total for the four months up to 48,985,436 gallons or 1,267,332 gallons in excess of the sales for the first four months of 1933.

years, but a third failure will mean permanent rejection. Heretofore applicants could try out as long as they could get the permission of the court. There are already 120 bills pending in the senate and 120 in the house on file for the next examinations which will be held in Salem on July 10 and 11.

Theodore Dunsford, who died in the state hospital here this week, had served 79 years in the state institution and was aged inmate of the hospital. He was originally committed from Linn county.

The color design for the 1935 automobile license plates has already been decided. The plates will be black with bright yellow figures and letters. State police regard this color combination as one of the most practical.

Oregon has \$6,000,000 interest in the Cartright bill now pending before congress and which would appropriate \$400,000,000 for emergency highway relief work during the coming year. The measure in brief, proposes a continuation of the federal highway program in force during the past year. Fear has been expressed by R. H. Baldoock, state highway engineer, lest congress adopt the proposed amendment to the measure reducing the appropriation to \$100,000,000 and Oregon's share to approximately \$1,500,000. Such a reduction, according to Baldoock, would be disastrous to the highway program in this state, necessitating the discontinuation of practically all new construction projects after July 1 and throwing some 3000 men out of work.

Baldoock points out that the highway department has no funds for new construction and is dependent entirely on federal aid for this part of the state highway program.
