Mrs. Letty Hoover of Gaston, whose essay, "The Highway to Health," was awarded first prize in the state of Oregon in the eleventh meat story contest sponsored by the National Livestock and Meat Board. A total of 10,594 home economics students from 569 high schools of 47 states participated in this contest. Today, according to Mrs. Hoover, we know that the food we eat is useful in three ways. It furnishes energy, it supplies the energy for building strong bodies and it also supplies elements necessary for regulating body processes. Her closing statement is: "Meats are apparently better able to furnish a wide range of the essential food materials than almost any other food."

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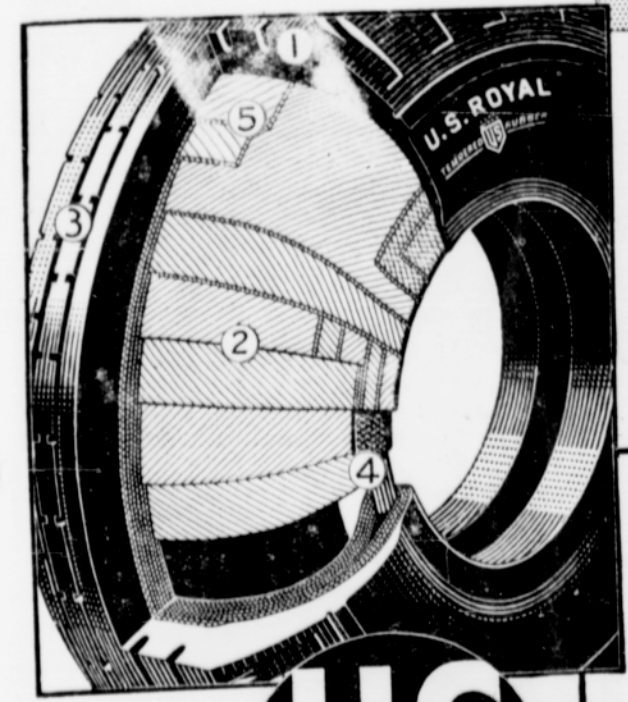


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
