To agree to pay anyone 50 per cent of the proceeds for collecting their interest in any of these associations, Carey points out, is merely throwing away 50 per cent of that to which they are rightfully entitled to receive when liquidation of the associations is finally accomplished.

Traffic accidents on Oregon highways claimed 28 lives during May, an increase of nine over the fatal record for the same month a year ago. This brings the total up to 117 fatalities for the year to date compared with 90 for the first five months of 1933. Traffic injuries this year are also well ahead of the record for last year.

Flagmen employed on highway construction jobs must hereafter greet their public with a smile. Officers of the Oregon Highway Department of R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, that more attention must be given in the selection of sufficient personality to handle a job of this kind and must be instructed to be courteous, polite and gracious at all times and to all people who use the public highways.

Teachers' examinations will soon be a thing of the past, according to C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction. Each year the number of teachers holding one-year certificates becomes fewer. Last year there were only 676 in Oregon out of 5419 teachers in the elementary grades. Four years ago there were 1082. Nearly all teachers now secure their certificates on the basis of normal school or college training.

Regard for the distribution of federal funds for highway construction this year under the Hayden-Cartwright bill which has passed both houses of congress, was \$4,896,500 as compared to \$10,389,436 last year, according to R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer. Of this year's allotment to this state \$3,221,500 will be disbursed by the highway commission in the improvement of state highways. The remainder, \$1,675,000 will be spent by the bureau of public roads on forest highways, forest trails, national park roads and Indian reservation roads.

Hearing on Code for Bakeries Set A hearing will be held by the director of agriculture of Oregon on a petition and marketing agreement among those engaged in the baking industry in the state at 10 a. m. June 27 at room 314 state capitol building in Salem. All persons interested in the making of an agreement and the adoption of a code, or opposed thereto, are requested and required to appear.

At last there are definite signs of progress in the long drawn-out negotiations between the state highway department and the Public Works administration. Word from the national capital is that executive and official approval has been given to the increased loan for the Coast highway bridges and that the two contracts are on the way. Highway officials, however, are not to be satisfied with contracts or promises. They insist on seeing the color of Uncle Sam's money before proceeding any further with the bridge program and are sending J. M. Devereaux, their attorney, back to Washington with instructions to stay on the job until he can get his hands on some of the PWA cash. Until he does contracts for four of the five bridges will continue to wait, but highway officials are now confident that all of the bridges will be under construction within a few days.

Local NRA compliance boards were relieved of their tasks and responsibilities of administering the president's re-employment agreement June 15. In the future all complaints arising under the president's re-employment agreement should be filed with the office of the state NRA compliance director in Portland. Letters conveying the thanks of the president and the administrators of the Oregon office of all compliance boards in the United States by General Johnson for the services rendered.

Insured fire losses in Washington county during 1933 totaled \$119,091.93, according to the annual report of A. H. Averill, state fire marshal. The report records a total of 119 fires in the county during the year involving property valued at \$1,320,242.56. Insurance paid on the year's losses amounted to \$99,546.21. For the state as a whole the year's fire loss totaled \$2,713,360.85, compared to \$2,840,000 paid on fire losses during the year amounted to \$2,266,375. The per capita loss for the year amounted to \$2.84 compared to \$3.03 for the five-year period.

The general fund of the state is today in the best condition that it has been in for several years, according to Fred Paulus, deputy state treasurer. The state is on a cash basis with no obligations to banks or other funds and has a neat cash balance on hand. Property and income taxes still due, together with corporation and other fees are expected to be sufficient to keep the state on a cash basis, with probably a small loan from the Soldiers' Bonus commission for the remainder of the year. The condition of the general fund after the close of the year, Paulus admits, will depend largely upon the action of the lawmakers. If they continue to sit on the lid the general fund deficit, though entirely disappear during the next biennium. If on the other hand, the legislators open the purse strings to the demands for large appropriations for new buildings, increased payrolls, etc., not only will the deficit continue indefinitely, but Paulus indicates that it may even be necessary to return to a warrant basis again.

The state payroll for May totaled approximately \$328,000, according to Secretary of State Stedman. Of this total \$175,000 went to employees of the highway department, \$140,000 to employees of the live institutions of higher education and \$52,000 to employees of state institutions. Salaries of the state police, liquor commission, department of agriculture, commission and state department, including the motor vehicle division, and other state administrative departments totaled \$171,977 divided among 1434 employees.
