Park grounds have been put in shape to accommodate visitors during the event. The midway, which has been dusty in past years, has been planted to grass and this is expected to eliminate the dust problem. Picnic tables and benches have been repaired and the floor of the auditorium sanded and prepared for dancing. The park will be decorated with flags, banners and colored lights while concessions, "ferris wheel," "merry-go-round," "hit-a-whirl," glider and other devices have been provided for entertainment.

uate of 1878 from Pacific university. Lieser, who was introduced by a former pupil, L. E. Wilkes, declared that he came to Washington county in 1880 and enrolled at Pacific university in 1884, living with the Rev. Walker family at Forest Grove. He started teaching in county schools in 1870 and many of the members of the association were his pupils.

Declaring that in the 82 years of his life he had been out of the state of Oregon but 1 1/2 hours, Sam Walker of Forest Grove recalled the days when the Tualatin valley was covered with forests and told of clearing the land for crops. He related the hardships endured by his pioneer parents.

Other features of the program included several violin selections by "Fiddling Sam" Walker of Forest Grove, vocal numbers by W. C. Becknap of Portland and the reading of a poem on pioneer days by George Doughty. Little Donna Mae Ritchie of Portland sang a song, sung by her grandmother 88 years ago in the Hillsboro public school. Resolutions of condolence for those who had passed away since the last reunion were read by Wilkes, chairman of the necrology committee.

Robert H. Down, principal of Franklin high school, Portland, who was scheduled as the principal program speaker, failed to attend the afternoon session, although he had been present at the picnic dinner.
