United States, he said, has always maintained high ideals in its foreign policy, but not enough attention has been given to the peace and well being of our own people. Mr. Peters cited the laxness in immigration policies, which has permitted many to come here that are not fit for American citizenship.

Obedience to law is the cement in the foundation of our government, declared the local attorney, who decried the infection from within lawlessness. He said it was a fine and courageous thing for a citizen to stand up for the law.

Program important. Necessity of such patriotic programs to bring out the real spirit of Independence day was stressed by Paul L. Patterson, who presided over the program. He stated that the conditions under which the program had to be carried on under present arrangements were an imposition on the patriotic American people.

Flood Damage Data Obtained

Group Seeks Federal Funds for Control Programs

That much of the most valuable farming land in Washington county is being reverted to waste lands by the erosive action of flood waters which break over the banks of the Tualatin river was the substance of testimony collected in Hillsboro Thursday by officers of the Willamette Valley Flood Control association. Officers of the body, which represent nine valley counties, are now gathering flood damage data to incorporate in an application seeking federal aid for flood control.

Many acres of formerly good farming land has been transferred to waste land on the county tax rolls, County Judge Donald T. Templeton declared in discussing conditions in the county. Some of these areas could be made productive and increased in assessed valuation if floods could be controlled.

When land goes off the tax roll, the burden of the irreducible cost of county government goes on to the farmer to bear the tax, according to Judge Templeton. Taxes have been reduced on farms where the river is decreasing their value. Proper flood control measures would permit this land to bear its proper share of taxes, he said.
