TIMBER—Owing to the regular fourth of July shutdown of the different logging companies the Southern Pacific company has discontinued three of its regular trains and are running local freight clear through to Tillamook until after the shutdown. The freight usually runs from Timber to Wheeler. After the shutdown a large volume of business from the several logging companies on the Tillamook branch is expected.

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Truck Operators Must Meet Costs

Truck operators in Oregon have not been relieved of making a showing that they are operating above cost under the code for the trucking industry, according to the Oregon state code authority.

To the contrary, Ralph J. Staehli, secretary of the code authority, points that the administrator is particularly concerned with having truck operators in all fields file their minimum rates to the end that truck operators can be placed on a plane where reasonable wages and reasonable hours can be maintained.
