Capitol News Letter

Motor vehicle registrations for the first six months of 1934 show a 33.8 per cent increase over registrations for the six months of 1933.

Secretary of State Stadelman has announced an aggressive campaign against gasoline tax refund claimers.

Already an arrest has been made for alleged filing of a fraudulent claim and a number of suspicious claims are under investigation.

Refunds are being paid on some 2500 claims each month with approximately 10,000 individuals taking advantage of this provision of the gasoline tax law which provides for refunds of the tax on gasoline used in farm tractors, motor boats, cleaning establishments and for other purposes which do not involve the use of the highways.

Mutual betting does not constitute a lottery, according to Attorney General Van Winkle who in an opinion this week, ruled that betting on dog races does not violate the constitutional inhibition against lotteries.

Receipts by the city total \$19,900

Actual expenditures by the city are \$14,886 below the budgeted amounts for the first six months, according to McGee's report.

The budget allowed \$962.50 for general expense and \$1470 for street lighting. Salaries paid by the CWA for the first half of 1934, but only \$945.64 has been spent.
