

Quilt Exhibit Banks Friday Real Success

BANKS—The quilt exhibit given by the Wakapu-Nabus Camp Fire group in the high school auditorium Friday evening was a decided success. Many beautiful and historical quilts were exhibited making the job of picking the winners a hard one.

The parent, written and presented by the girls, was very impressive. In it an aged grandmother was represented as telling the story of her quilts to three granddaughters. Songs were sung to fit the stories. Many of these stories were true.

Mrs. W. T. Sellers won first prize for the oldest quilt, it being 109 years old. Miss Leora Williams won second on a homespun quilt, 93 years old. Mrs. Eli Grindle and Miss Sylvia Severance received honorable mention for quilts, 45 years old.

In the best quilted division, Miss Wilma Marr won first prize on a Dresden plate quilt. Honorable mention went to Mrs. Elmer Grindle on an Irish quilt and to Mrs. J. J. Hutchens on a flower garden quilt. Hutchens was judged on design and length of stitches.

In the prettiest quilt division Mrs. R. M. Banks won first prize on a double wedding ring and Miss Sylvia Severance won second prize on an ocean wave quilt. Honorable mention went to Miss Mamie Sandy on a postage stamp quilt, to Miss Sylvia Severance on a homespun quilt and to Mrs. Flora Munford on a log cabin. Points for judging the prettiest quilt were color, 25 per cent, design 25 per cent, material 15 per cent, finish 15 per cent and neatness 20 per cent.
