Size 18 calls for 3 1/2 yards of 35-inch fabric.

Brighten otherwise drab kitchen work with No. 253, a charming apron frock of checked gingham. Note the simple lines, contrasting collar and revers. Printed linen or chambray is splendid for this apron, which closes in the front. It comes in sizes 32 to 42. Size 38 needs 5 1/2 yards of 32-inch fabric, or 5 yards plus 1/2 yard contrast.

Suitable for many occasions during the summer is the youthful, nonchalant-appearing No. 228. The high buttoned neckline and sleeves are naive, yet smart. Linen, faille, and broadcloth are the materials. Designs are in sizes 14 to 20 and 32 to 42. Size 18 requires 3 1/2 yards of 39-inch fabric.
