

Lilly Family Holds Big Reunion Sunday

BANKS—The Lilly clan of Oregon held their annual reunion Sunday in Balm Grove park, celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the arrival of the Lillys in Oregon.

In 1884, the late David Lilly, honored father of the clan, moved to Oregon with his family and settled on Gales creek. He and his married sons bought farms and lived there until death. Three of his family still live there. They are Emma Hines, Mrs. Edith Hundley and D. G. Lilly. Joe Lilly lives at Washougal, Wash. Many other descendants of Mr. Lilly live in Washington, Oregon, California, and in various eastern states.

David Lilly, who was a Baptist minister, preached his first sermon in Oregon in a school house which stood in what is now known as Balm Grove park.

After dinner speeches were made by G. Lilly, president of the clan, Mrs. James DeLillis of Tillamook, N. J. Geoghegan of Vancouver, Wash., Ernest VanMarkel and Mrs. Fred Wolford of Portland.

Seated at the bountiful picnic table were 105 members of the clan and 16 visitors. Other visitors came in the afternoon.

Mrs. James DeLillis of Tillamook showed a picture of the Lilly coat-of-arms and a beautiful birthday cake. This cake was cut by Mrs. Emma Hines, oldest living daughter of David Lilly. She was dressed in a costume representing the coat-of-arms.

SWISS OFFICER'S CAP AND SWORD DISPLAYED

A Swiss officer's cap, sword, spurs and sabre knote are displayed in the Argus window this week. They are the property of Walter Kuhn of Hillsboro. The sword was first worn by his grandfather, the Kuhn, in the battle of Sonderbundelzueg in 1840. His father, Andreas Kuhn, wore it in the Franco-Prussian war in 1870, and his youngest brother Ernest wore it in the World War.

The sabre knote was worn by Ulrich, major of sharpshooters, who was killed in action in 1840. The spurs were worn by Andreas and Ernest, who were artillery officers. The cap was worn by Walter in 1901 and 1909.

They were sent to him recently by his brother Ernest, as they are heirlooms handed down from father to the eldest son, August 1 is Swiss Independence Day, comparable to our Fourth of July.
