city park and for the construction of tennis courts on the city-owned Bagley lots were approved by the council and the city engineer directed to prepare applications. The council also approved the recommendation relative to the placing of signs of civic organizations at the city limits.

Discussion was also held concerning the submission of a project to the SERA for the cutting of weeds on parking and city lots, and removal of tree limbs which interfere with sidewalks. Preparation of an ordinance regulating sidewalk obstructions was also considered.

Request of W. G. Ide for additional fire protection on Grant street between Third and Fifth streets was tabled by the council pending solution of the controversy between the city and the Oregon-Washington Water Service company relative to fire fighting water pressure. He declared that there were no hydrants closer than 300 feet to houses in the area and that insurance rates were higher for this reason.

Proposal to place new pavement on East Main street between Eighth and Tenth streets as an SERA project was turned down by the council. Councilmen held that the project would not provide a great amount of employment. They favored repairing the road for the present.

Other business considered by the council included the granting of permission to Dr. J. O. Robb to place hospital signs near the Jones hospital, report on proposal to open Baseline street east of Tenth street, and report on cleaning up the city park. A letter from the state highway commission stating that \$10,000 had been allocated for the widening of Baseline street from Fifth street to the railroad track was read.

At this time the pump is delivering approximately 1500 gallons of water a minute which means that on a 24-hour day there is being pumped 2,160,000 gallons of water. For a month beginning about the 5th or 6th of July, this pump ran on a 24-hour day everyday and was only shut down an hour or two at a time for adjustments that had to be made after it had started operating. In discussing irrigation at the lunch on his farm Tuesday, Thornburgh stated that irrigation increased the capacity of a given piece of ground and just doubled its production.
