They believe that the salvation of our country lies in the upholding and enforcing of the American principles of government as found and laid down in our constitution and institutions. "Members of the executive committee here are W. G. Hare, C. T. Richardson, R. R. Easter, E. B. Tongue, Dr. R. J. Nicol, Fred Engeldinger, Dr. J. O. Robb, H. L. MacKenzie, R. J. Scarsore, P. L. Patterson, and W. Verne McKinney. "There is no fee for joining. However, if a small sum can be afforded, it will be accepted. By a small sum is meant any amount under a dollar.
