But he is not yet in and bets around the capitol are that he will not file but that at the last minute he will again renounce his claim to future political honors and throw such strength as he may still command to the support of one of the other candidates. While the governor is believed to be personally anxious to make the plunge it is generally understood that the most potent factor in his former renunciation still exists—the insistence of Mrs. Meier that he shall not run.

The food and beverage dispensers are double-shooting their fight against the restaurant code. Not satisfied with resting their case on the injunction suit filed in the Marion county court attacking validity of the marketing agreement, a remonstrance against the code signed by 173 restaurant operators was filed with Governor Meier this week. In their suit the food dispensers charge that the restaurant code represent the assumption of legislative functions by the executive and administrative departments of state government. In their remonstrance they charge that the code is "unfair, unreasonable and unjust" and ask that it be cancelled.

Add to the list of candidates the names of Abraham M. Silverman of Portland and W. S. Richards of Albany. Silverman filed this week as an independent candidate for governor. He was nominated by an assembly of voters held in Portland Friday. Richards is a candidate for congress from the first district of Oregon on the socialist ticket opposing James W. Mott, republican, and H. R. Turner, democrat.

Possibility of a friendly suit to test out validity of the proposed issue of certificates of indebtedness to finance unemployment relief is seen here. While state officials are convinced that the issue, backed by profits from the state liquor system, will not violate the constitution, the liquor industry is not so sure. In excess of \$50,000 it may take the "ok" of the supreme court to satisfy investors on this point. Estimates submitted by the Liquor Control board indicate that profits from the liquor business should be sufficient to insure retirement of the entire \$1,250,000 issue well before the end of 1935.

Contracts for the 89 highway projects on the 1934 federal aid program will be awarded in four installments, beginning in September and December. It is expected to start work on the September awards this fall but the November and December lettings will probably not get under way until next spring.

Oregon has pioneered the way in the adoption of modern methods of highway construction and maintenance, according to R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer. Many highway engineering principles and devices now in general use throughout the country were first adopted by the Oregon department, Baldock claims. Among these were the present method of grading roads, now everywhere design and perfection of a center line striping machine widely copied by other states and the use of hot patching plants which has made possible the maintenance of smooth pavements at small expense. Oregon is also one of the first states to revive the old Roman method of heavy foundation for road construction, representing a complete revolution in highway science and which Baldock claims has resulted in a saving of \$2,000,000 in highway maintenance in the past eight years. Oregon also leads in bridge design and construction, possessing some of the most beautiful and artistic bridges in the nation. The state was also the first to enact a gasoline tax for the financing of highway construction and maintenance.

A total of 1517 Oregon teachers were provided with part time employment this year through federal emergency educational relief program, according to O. D. Adams, director of the education department. These teachers conducted 1800 classes enrolling 34,410 individuals. Expenditures by the federal government for this work totaled \$168,325.68. Approximately 15,000 children attending rural schools were enabled to continue in school by reason of this federal aid and 650 rural school teachers who would otherwise have been out of a job were kept on the payroll for a normal eight month term.

Although traffic fatalities for July were fewer by three than for the corresponding month of 1933 the year's record to date continues well ahead of last year. Figures compiled by Secretary of State Stadman show that there have been 165 deaths due to traffic accidents in the first seven months of 1934 compared to 142 for the first seven months of 1933. Traffic accidents for the seventh month period total 11,341, nearly 1000 ahead of last year's record and the toll of injured totaled 2668 compared to 2140 for last year.

Gasoline sales in Oregon for July totaled 15,836,884 gallons, a gain of more than 1,500,000 gallons over July, 1933. The state tax on the month's sales amounted to \$791,829.24.
