

# Twin "Round-Up" Highlights Interest

The "Twin Round-Up" Saturday afternoon proved to be one of the most interesting events of the fair. Registrations were made for 30 pairs of twins and one for triplets. Washington county is getting famous for its twins, this being a greater number than ever before registered, excepting in 1929, when the first "Round-Up" was held and was sponsored by the Argus. That year there were 33 registrations, but twins outside the county were included. It is interesting to note that prizes that year were \$100 down. Since that year the Business and Professional Women's club has sponsored the event, the next largest event being in 1931, with 22 registrations.

C. D. Minton, manager of the fair, presided at the contest, which was opened with a grand march led by Mrs. Don McInnis of near Reedville with her 8-month-old sons Donald and Duncan, followed by all competing twins and triplets.

Mrs. O. H. Sisk, Mrs. Z. R. Rogers and Mrs. Minnie Jones were the committee from the Business and Professional Women's club, in charge of the contest. The judges were Mrs. C. E. Johnson of Salem, Mrs. Margaret Fitchard of Portland, and Mrs. Florence Raymond of Hillsboro. On account of the large registration it was decided that this should be an elimination contest, and as one pair of twins received a prize they were eliminated from competing for another prize. High lights of the "Round-Up" included the possibility of Fred and Dick Wilcox, Banks and Forest Grove carrying away four prizes—living in Washington county the longest, being the oldest twins, 69 years, the tallest, and possibly making the most unique as they are very dissimilar in looks and stature. Another pair looked so much alike that the judges didn't know they were twins. The late June Boswell of Beaverton, Mrs. Sohler and Mrs. Waibel might also have taken a prize for dissimilarity in looks, and Mrs. Monroe Hutchens of Laurel had two pairs of twins in the "Round-Up" and received an extra prize for the honor. In the contest for the Bristol Hardware were American Legion and Auxiliary members, the Hutchens twins birthdays were April 16, and the Boswell twins were born April 23, both pair being eight years of age. Two other pairs were in this classification, the other Hutchens twins and the Ledford children, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Ledford, are both members of the Legion, the mother being an overseas war nurse, and a member of the Auxiliary. When it came to the "Dressed alike" classification, there were so many that all were given a prize.

The triplet daughters of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Ewer of Aloha, looked very much alike, but were not the same height. The B and P club wishes to thank all who so generously helped in donating prizes, or in any other way, and announces that if any twins failed to get their prize they should leave word at the Argus office.

Three pair of twins that registered, but failed to appear at the "Round-Up" were date and Davis Auld, Don Ray and Ron Roy Hubbard, and Elmer J. Jr. and Anna Jean Williams, all of Hillsboro. Names of the prize-winning twins appear on page four.
