It costs slightly less today to provide medical attention for an injured workman under the Oregon workmen's compensation act than it did a year ago or two years ago, but still the cost is well above the low figure established in 1929. In that year with a record of 41,746 accidents it cost an average of only \$17.98 per claim for medical aid. Figures of the accident commission show, then the costs for this service began to climb for some unaccountable reason to \$20.84 in 1930, \$23.02 in 1931 and \$23.68 in 1932. These vigorous protests from the commission halted the upward trend and the next year shows a slight decrease to \$22.37, still 31 per cent above the 1929 average and this year the medical aid cost was down to \$21.46 per claim, still 23.46 per cent above the 1929 low.

In selecting mandamus proceedings for testing out the validity of the proposed certificates of indebtedness to finance unemployment relief, the commission should have noted that the state has never stated a preliminary hearing in circuit court with its added delay. The situation, however, presents its unusual aspects with the state relief commission going to court to compel the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer to do something which all are anxious to do once they can be assured of its legal soundness.

Governor Meier in a proclamation issued last week declared a moratorium on the killing of pedestrians and motorists. In the past 18 months, the governor's proclamation points out 412 people lost their lives in traffic accidents on Oregon highways while another 6983 were more or less seriously injured, not to overlook the property damage of \$15,000,000 resulting from these wrecks. Most of the accidents, the governor points out, resulted either from carelessness or thoughtlessness.

Its just as easy to make as it is to wear. Designed in sizes 14, 16, 18 and 20 (with corresponding bust measures of 32, 34, 36 and 38) and also in 40 and 42. Size 18 requires 4 3/4 yards of 35-inch material, with 3/4 yard for collar and sleeve bands in contrast.

The jumper frock pictured as Pattern 178 just exudes sauciness. It is in peach-colored flannel with blouse of cream crepe, designed for sizes 11 to 19 (bust 29 to 37). Size 15 calls for 3 yards of 35-inch fabric for the dress and 1 1/2 yards for the gumpie. Linen, pique, and crepe are suitable materials. And now that school days are nigh, what could be more suitable for the young miss starting back to school than the demure jumper frock, Pattern 3508? The fact that it can be worn with different blouses makes it both practical and smart.

Red and white gingham with blouse of white linen, or velvet with a crepe blouse, are suggested combinations. Designed in four sizes: 8, 10, 12, and 14 years, size 12 requires 1 1/4 yards of 54-inch material for the dress, and 1 1/4 yards of 35-inch material for the gumpie. The bow of narrow ribbon requires 3/4 yard.
