Miss Onalee Shelley of Los Angeles, Cal., spent a few days with her mother, Mrs. Donal Francis, recently.

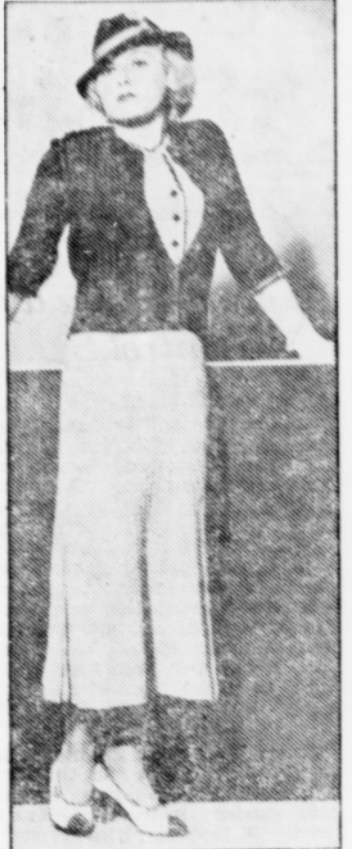
