

County Health Body Will Open Fall Work

FOREST GROVE—Washington County Public Health association will open its fall work on Tuesday when it meets in the Legion hall at Sherwood. J. L. Strand, chairman of the welfare committee of the American Legion, president of the association and local representative for the county health association, is in charge of arrangements.

Plans for the winter program of promoting health in our community will be outlined. Speakers have been arranged for the program which starts at 8 p. m. Mrs. E. M. Marsh will report on the tuberculosis institute conducted as a part of the extension center of the University of Oregon under the direction of Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association. Dr. Rucker, Sherwood, will talk on tuberculosis and its treatment and introduce Homer Chamblin, director of public information for the Oregon Tuberculosis association, who will show moving picture films on tuberculosis.

The committee on standards of health for schools will report their recommendations for A-1 health rating in schools. Members of this committee include E. Arant, principal of the Forest Grove public school, Mrs. A. J. Johansen of Glenwood and Mrs. Hugh McGilvray.
